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GREETINGS FROM THE PREZ



It's just about show time. People are filing into the theater, the orchestra is tuning and I hear the fat lady warming up backstage. The spring series commences in just 28 days. **Charlie Pendleton** has dusted off an article on spring preparation that he wrote for us 5-6 years ago, and we're

including it in this edition to help get you going.

A few important reminders as we ease into the season. First registration is open for everything - Fleet 5, the Class Association, MRA, East Coasts and even Nationals. For Fleet 5 and MRA, you have to register by May 5th to avoid a late fee. *So put down this rag and go do that before you forget.* Details are on page 2.

Second is the spring clinic, which will be held in the Fantail at the CYC on the 5th. We labor over what to do for a clinic – should we focus on strategy, tactics, boat set-up, crew work, rules or something else? After batting it around for a while, we found that the thing folks are most interested in is boat speed, which makes sense, right? Great boat speed makes anyone look like a genius. That little extra something allows you to get off the line, hold your lane, force the other guy to duck and so on. And good boat speed isn't an accident, nor is it the result of any one thing. It's the result of a combination of a lot of things, including how you manage your sails, set up your systems, prepare the bottom, drive through waves, go through the gears, spinnaker work, tacking technique and so on. It's everything.

So this year's clinic will feature a panel of four of your Fleet 5 brethren who have demonstrated pretty consistent boat speed over the years:

Charlie Pendleton, Jim Taylor, Jeff Shoreman and BC sailing coach

Evan "the kid" Cooke. I will moderate, ask the probing questions and generally see to it that no secret is left unrevealed. You don't want to miss this one

Third is mast measurement day. If you've changed your mast or have bought a new one, you have to have it measured before sailing, and this gives you the opportunity to get that done with no muss or fuss. Measurer **Josh Wheeler** says he can measure your mast in about 15 minutes. The event will be Saturday May 7th in the EYC parking lot from 1-3pm. So if you need to do this, please let us know in advance by contacting **Jim Raisides** at jim@raisides.com.

Finally, the East Coasts will be held on Fathers' day weekend, which is only about six weeks away. This one will sneak up on you so start planning now. Rockport is a great venue and close enough to tow by water. I'm pretty sure there will be a few tow options this year, including old friend **Mike Lane**, and we'll let you know as they get organized. Sandy Bay always puts on a great show and from what I've heard, this one will be no different. So secure your hall pass and lock in your 3rd.

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FLEET PROFILE - MEET LARRY EHRHARDT

Fleet 5 welcomed Larry Ehrhardt last summer when he hit the starting line in 2435 previously owned by Kent Hallawell and Jerry Blouin. It didn't take long for all of us to realize we needed to take this guy seriously. He served notice by finished second for the day his first time out for MRA and was pretty much in the mix every time out. So, with a season under his belt, we wanted to see what Larry thinks about Rhodes sailing. Read on to learn how Larry got hooked and insights like how big orange objects tempt young crew.

What was the first boat you ever sailed?

The first boat I remember sailing was my parents' 210 out of Marblehead Harbor in 1972. They lived in Lexington, but would make the trip to participate in MRA and sometimes take a day sail. After we moved to the Connecticut, I started sailing Dyer Dhows as part of the Junior Sailing program at American YC in Rye, NY.

What got you started in Rhodes?

Where did the name "Rallie" come from?
Rallie was the name of my Sonar and is a blend of Ruthie and

What is your favorite non-sailing activity? My favorite non-sailing sport is squash. I play a couple of times a week at the Y.

What do you do for work?

Mobile application design and development. My company, which I started five years ago, is called Ballast Lane Applications.

What is your most memorable sailing moment?

There are many, but winning the deciding race in the Halloween Team Race finals in 2014 was special as there was a small crowd (including my wife Rebecca) on the porch of EYC there to

witness. It was also a really close race that could have gone either way.

What is the biggest bonehead thing you've done during a race? In the Rhodes, it was the day I let **Seamus Hourihan** and **Peter Frisch** gybe inside of us in all three races at the windward mark

and take the lead. Didn't quite get the lesson that day.

What is the biggest bonehead thing a crew of yours has done during a race?

Well it's not really a bonehead thing, but on Friday of the East Coasts last year, I needed Travis (9 at the time) to jump on the boat as a third. He had never really raced before and was very excited to be near a big orange balloon (otherwise know as the mark) and almost grabbed it as we passed by during the first rounding of the day.

What's the best tip you could give someone who is sailing a Rhodes for the first time?

I guess it would be to make sure you have the team in place so that, as skipper, you can focus all of your attention on keeping the boat moving through the water as fast as possible. It seems so easy to start going really slow if you miss a wave or fall out of the groove for even a moment.

What book are you reading? The Big Short by Michael Lewis.

Name one thing about yourself that fellow Fleet 5 members might be surprised to know about you.

My wife and I lived in Costa Rica for a summer where we studied Spanish and travelled around the region.

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A GAME OF PREPARATION by Charlie Pendleton



One of the best moments in spring is taking the cover off of your Rhodes. Whether it's cutting into the shrink wrap or untying the knots that secure the tarp, you can't help but smile and start thinking about all the great racing ahead and the stories that will come with it. There is usually a list of things that you need to do to your Rhodes that have been in your head all winter. Once you peel back the cover, that list usually

grows. Most Rhodes in the Marblehead fleet were built in the late 60s and early 70s and they need ongoing attention and maintenance. A huge part of competitive sailing is preparation, the things that you do off the water.

Jim and I meet once each spring and go over the big picture items that need attention. Usually these are things that got in the way or slowed us down the prior season and require some level of re-working. This year we're re-running the traveler and replacing a halyard or two. Last year we built a new boom, and replaced the frac line. The prior year we re-varnished the floor boards with non-skid because we were slipping around too much.

With a Rhodes, the real challenge is knowing what to fix before it breaks. We regularly replace things that are working just fine. If you wait to replace equipment until it breaks, it usually costs you a race and maybe a day of racing. Here are some of the things that typically break – replace them before they do: Vang (line, blocks and shackles), boom gooseneck (check the pins/bolts), tiller extension universals, halyards, rudder pintles and gudgeons.

Before the mast is stepped, check the main, spinnaker and jib halyard sheaves to make sure they're oiled and spinning (I can hear some of you hoisting your sails from across the harbor!). Next, check your halyards and then make sure there are no frayed or snapped wires on the stays. A good trick with halyards is to remove 6 inches from the sail end. It will change the load points and get you fresh/strong line at the securing points. Inspect the spreaders and make sure they're secure and marked to help the jib trimmer – replace any electrical tape with fresh wraps. Clean and oil the stay turnbuckles. Don't forget to put the windex back on!

I'll go from bow to stern with a screw driver and a pair of pliers to make sure every screw, nut and bolt that loosened up last season is tight again. Then I'll oil blocks, cam cleats and spinnaker pole fittings to make sure they are running freely. Replace and tape ring dings if necessary. Finally, check your lines for wear and tear, (re)burn the ends to keep them from fraying and to prevent the sleeves from separating from the core.

Remember your other equipment. Replace your lifting straps every 3-4 years - even if they look fine. They are cheap to replace and I see way too many old lifting straps in use. Inspect your flotation, if it's an air bag make sure it's not leaking. Keep your trailer in good working order, flat tires make for an aggravating start to your day. Work done off the water leads to consistent results on the water. Spring is the perfect time to get your Rhodes running like a top.


