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#### MEET KEN CORMIER

Ken Cormier's personal sailing history is long, varied, and rich with anecdotes. From Sandy Bay to Kiel, Germany, Ken has trimmed many a sail on a long list of one-design and blue water racers from 110s to Solings, in which he won the North Americans with **Dave Curtis** and **Robbie Doyle**. Just a couple of years ago, Ken jumped into a chartered R19 and, co-skippering with **Steve Dalton**, tied for first in one of the most competitive Rhodes regattas in recent history. With the fire lit and stoked, he promptly teamed up with Steve's brother, **Bill Dalton**, to buy **Chris Hutchinson's** 1790. A very unexpected triple by-pass put a crimp in his style last year, but he is fully recovered and ready to kick all our asses again.

What was the first boat you ever sailed? A Turnabout at Sandy Point during the Eisenhower administration.

How long have you been sailing Rhodes? Taught sailing in them in 1969 through 1971 but did not skipper one in a race until 2004 on Brass Rat. I loved 110s as a kid, and they planed!

Why did you start sailing Rhodes?

Sandy Warrick recruited me in a supermarket aisle in York, ME during Race Week 2003 when his son mutinied after Sandy had dunked him overboard (tea-bagged) at least once on the first day of Race Week.

What is your favorite non-sailing activity? Probably home improvements. It is something my wife, Ellie, and I can collaborate on.

What do you do for work?

My final career is Financial Services with New York Life: Insurance, Retirement Planning, Business Owners' needs. I do miss the hands-on manufacturing processes that began with sail making in the 60's and 70's and continued with industrial textiles until 2001.

What is your most memorable sailing moment?

That is very hard to answer. I had a great summer in 1970 that included winning the Olympic Soling North Americans in Houston in June with **Dave Curtis** and **Robbie Doyle**, then getting all firsts in Race Week in my 110 in July, and then going to Kiel Germany in August to sail in the Pre-Olympic Regatta at Kiel Week and finishing third out of 70 Solings. **Elvstrom** won. **John Dane** was second. And we were all ages 20 - 22 at the time. It was a breakout summer for this Sandy Pointer!

What is the biggest bonehead thing a crew of yours has ever done during a race?

Navigators! On a Halifax race in '73 aboard **Westy Adams**' C&C 35 "Stampede," our navigator, who will remain unnamed, had us enter an enclosed cove instead of the final

approach to the finish line. We had the chute up in an enclosed shallow rocky anchorage and had to drop sails, put up a genoa, beat upwind to the open sea, all because this "airline pilot" was navigating in True as opposed to Magnetic. That could have been a real disaster, but fortunately it was daylight and not dark.

What is the biggest bonehead thing you've done during a race either as skipper or crew?

So many... so little time. I tried to add up the scores between races on the last day of the IOD Worlds in Larchmont in 1985, but the finish line was kind of frantic. So, in the final race, we

were leading the series after the morning's race and I calculated that only one boat could beat us, so we covered him as he went south while we knew the breeze was trending west. We crossed the line to no horns or cheering as we lost the series by 1/4 point.

That, and insisting **Kim P**. make a short tack to a northerly puff at the finish of the next to last race of the 2010 Rhodes Nationals as the fleet clustered around us at the finish line in a big hole. We went

from third to 13<sup>th</sup> as the breeze returned to where we were before. That cost us 10 boats in a series we lost by one point. Yes, I still feel bad for that one. Sorry Buddy!

What's the best tip you could give someone who is sailing a Rhodes for the first time?

Get really comfortable going downwind, and take full advantage of the shore-side generosity of your fellow competitors. They all want you to be competitive. I still ask for rigging and tuning advice constantly.

What book are you reading?

I am afraid my reading is all studying and pretty tiring.

Name one thing about yourself that fellow Fleet 5 members might be surprised to know.

I co-facilitated a men's bible study for several years at the church I attended in York, ME. It was actually a rich experience enjoyed by all.

Congratulations to **Team Frisch / Hourihan**, who finished with a paltry 167 of those, earning them bragging rights for the 2017 season championship. Finishing 2<sup>nd</sup> was **Team Lane / Heffernan**, who put up 180.5 points and was the most disappointed of all when the wash outs of the last two Fall Series days. Taking 3<sup>rd</sup> more than 50 points off the pace was **Team Pandapas**, who rolled 211 points. 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#### A FEW THOUGHTS FROM THE INCOMING PREZ

I dearly miss **Fred Brehob**, who I am certain is now encouraging people to do things the right way (his way) in the Great Beyond. His love for the Rhodes 19 knew no bounds, and he served as our Class Historian and delightfully irascible Class Conscience

for as long as there has been a local fleet. Long after Fred's health issues forced him to give up racing, (be assured that he was a force in his day!), he would accost me in Crosby's Market with pointed questions about our Class Rules, the fiberglass keel, recent race results, etc. He was certainly old school, but he always had the best interests of the Class in mind, and he could (and did!) bring five decades of R-19 experience and perspective to bear in making his points.

In one such incident a few years ago, Fred pulled me aside demanding to know how there could be a new Fleet 5 president when we hadn't had an election. I pointed out that we did not have any crowd control issues with the field of candidates seeking the job, and that we were lucky to have someone willing to take it on. He grudgingly accepted that approach to new leadership then, so I trust that he would be OK with it now, as I have agreed to succeed Kim as Fleet 5 President for 2018 (pending approval by membership, of course!).

Some might ask why it has taken me so long to take on the job, since I have been a fleet member for decades. The short answer is that I have run out of excuses. A more nuanced answer has at least two threads: First, that I have been involved in a lot of measurement and Class Rules issues over time, and I sensed that some people were tired of listening to me; and second, I have not wanted to take on the job until I had the time to do it justice. My priorities going forward are simply to be a good Fleet 5 steward and to keep doing all the things that have made it so successful for so long.

One thing that is obviously critical to the continued strength of Fleet 5 is all of the people who have contributed to it. We owe a huge debt of gratitude to founding fathers like Fred Brehob, and to stalwarts since such as **Steve Uhl**, **Tom Depres**, **Mike Lane**, **Doug Trees** and '**Team Pandapas**' (among many others) who have given so much for so long. For 2018, we are fortunate to have **Elise Nash** agree to be Vice President, and to pass the Social Chair/Fleet Bar torch (free at last!) to **Dave Reynolds**, who will now take on that most critical of Fleet 5 jobs. We are doubly lucky to have the rest of the 2017 team agree to stay on for 2018, with **Joe Fava** continuing as

Treasurer, **Jeff Shoreman** as Secretary, **Kim Pandapas** as Scorer, **Nat Taylor** as Webmaster and **Peter Sorlien** as Measurer

I have been racing in Fleet 5 (albeit somewhat irregularly) since the 80's, and I can say with no hesitation that the level of the competition has never been higher. Our talent pool is deeper than it has ever been, Fleet 5 dominates regional regattas, and any team that finishes in the top third in any of our 'home' races can go home feeling pretty good about themselves. However, it is imperative that we keep in mind that we are competing against our friends, and that we go racing for fun. We have a strong tradition of choosing not to waste precious time re-litigating race course incidents in the protest room, but there have been enough clear and unacknowledged fouls recently (mostly at weather marks) that suggest that some teams are taking advantage of this 'protest free' approach. This attitude is poisonous, it can't be allowed to become a trend, and it has to stop. Period. (More on this in later newsletters).

Of course, the success of Fleet 5 ultimately depends on all the sailors who show up at the starting line all summer long, and I do mean ALL the sailors'! In any racing fleet, some teams routinely finish on or near the podium, some get there now and then, and some seldom get more than an occasional sniff of glory. Make no mistake that this latter group is far and away the most essential to fleet health, as it provides the critical mass that keeps the racing viable as well as the new blood that keeps it vital. It's fine for the top boats to exchange ideas on the nuances of upper shroud tension, but much more important that they connect with those that may be struggling with how to make these cranky little boats go consistently fast. It is incumbent on all of us to engage with everyone in our membership, especially if they are from the 'other club', or the other end of the fleet standings. Our fleet parties (and our fleet bar!) attest to the fact that we enjoy each other's company, and accept that we are all in this together. It takes a village.
